




Ngā Kaiwhakatere o Taranaki

- Ngā Kaiwhakatere o Taranaki was established in 2020 to lead work across the region towards achieving the just transition vision outlined in the Taranaki 2050 Roadmap and Tapuae Roa.
- This includes supporting the successful implementation of plans and actions that make progress towards that vision
- The group is made up of 13 people members, representing pou across all of Taranaki.

Recap on Tapuae Roa and Taranaki 2050



Shorter-term, more traditional approach to economic development strategy.

Release: Strategy published in 2017, Action Plan published in April 2018

Focus: Economic growth; people

Process: Evidence base; focus groups; collaborative effort between Councils, VT, Ngā Iwi o Taranaki, the region's business leaders and the New Zealand government.

Adoption: Councils



Developed in recognition of need to plan for shift to a low-emissions future. Is an inter-generational vision.

Release: Roadmap published in August 2019, Transition Pathway Action Plans published between December 2019 and August 2020.

Focus: Low emissions, transition

Process: Inclusive, co-creation, 7 Pou

Adoption: Taranaki 2050 Lead group




Co-designing a vision for 2050

- Taranaki has the second highest emissions per capita in NZ, with strong petroleum and dairy industries.
- Ambition is to lead the way in NZ in transitioning our economy
- Used a co-creation process across the whole region, focused around the 7 pou (pillars) of communities, iwi, local and central government, businesses, educators and unions







Taranaki's vision for 2050


- A strong sustainable environment

- A region that looks out for and cares for itself and its people.






Developed 12 transition pathway action plans








Wellbeing, arts and vibrancy

- Creative Taranaki formed
- Significant investment by district councils e.g. a new pool, cycle park and council-developed subdivision in Stratford, Te Ramanui o Ruapūtahanga and a business park in Hāwera, town revitalisation plans for Eltham, Manaia, Ōpunakē, Pātea and Waverley and consideration of a multi-sport hub in New Plymouth





Infrastructure and Transport

- Roading: SH3, SH43
- Promoting electrical vehicles e.g. charging stations and Electricana event
- Sustainable transport workshops and information evenings
- Establishment of Taranaki Trails Trust and regional trails vision.
- NPDC Infrastructure Talent Pipeline
- Range of significant investment e.g. New airport terminal, digital investment, hospital, schools





Māori Futures

- Te Kāhui Maru Trust has been granted just over \$980,000 for its 17-week Tupu-ā-nuku Environmental Workforce Development training programme
- Ngā iwi o Taranaki planning and implementing a number of actions that are part of the region's Covid-19 Recovery Plan.

It's also been great to see so much of the COVID-19 recovery funding having a lowemissions focus, and we'll continue to integrate regional work and plans to support the 2050 vision.




